WILLIAM MCKINLEY (1843-1901) was the last Civil War veteran elected President. A successful attorney, he served Ohio as a U.S. representative and then governor. As the 25th U.S. President (1897-1901), he successfully led the Spanish-American War that expanded America's overseas territories and increased its stature as a world power. He was killed by an assassin several months into his second term.





THEODORE ROOSEVELT (1858-1919) became America's youngest chief executive at the age of 42. Among his many accomplishments, he was a prolific author, passionate environmentalist and distinguished soldier. As the 26th U.S. President (1901-1909), he was responsible for creation of the Panama Canal. In 1906, for his work negotiating an end to the Russo-Japanese War, he became the first American to win the Nobel Peace Prize.





WILLIAM HOWARD TAFT (1857-1930) was solicitor general of the United States and later the first civilian governor of the Philippines. He also served as Roosevelt's secretary of war. As the 27th U.S. President (1909-1913), he oversaw passage and ratification of the 16th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, which authorized a federal income tax. He later became the 10th chief justice of the United States (1921-1930).





WOODROW WILSON (1856-1924) served as president of Princeton University and then governor of New Jersey. As the 28th U.S. President (1913-1921), he guided America through the horrors and sacrifices of World War I and oversaw passage and ratification of the 19th Amendment, the celebrated provision granting women the right to vote. His tireless advocacy of the League of Nations earned him the Nobel Peace Prize.
